Camp Warwa is located about an hour west of Edmonton. As we are a rural location, here are all our addresses you may need for your paperwork.

Cancellations

Cancellations made more than 90 days in advance of your visit receive a full refund. Cancellations made within 90 days of your visit will not be refunded.

Deposits

In general, deposits are due within 30 days of making your booking.

For Spring booking, we require group numbers by February 1st. Payment is due March 1st (90% due). The final invoice will be provided when you arrive.

For Fall Bookings, deposits will be due 30 days before your booking. Please see your booking confirmation for details.

Activities & Activity Groups

We want to know what you want to do! Please complete the Visit Worksheet by ranking all the activities so we can make your schedule. Groups are given activity priority based on when they are booked into camp formally. We strive to get you all your top choices. If not, we will look to your rankings to give you your next top choice.

Each activity runs for between 75 – 90 minutes and will be led by one of our trained instructors. We will need you to divide your participants into activity groups before you arrive at camp. This will very likely be in groups of between 10-16.



Chaperone Responsibilities

Groups are expected to have about one chaperone per rotation group (10-16 students). The primary role of chaperones is to supervise the campers in your group. This includes programs, meals, free time, evenings and overnight. Camp Warwa staff will orient you when you arrive at camp and be there to help as needed during your visit. The primary role of Camp Warwa staff is to facilitate programs.

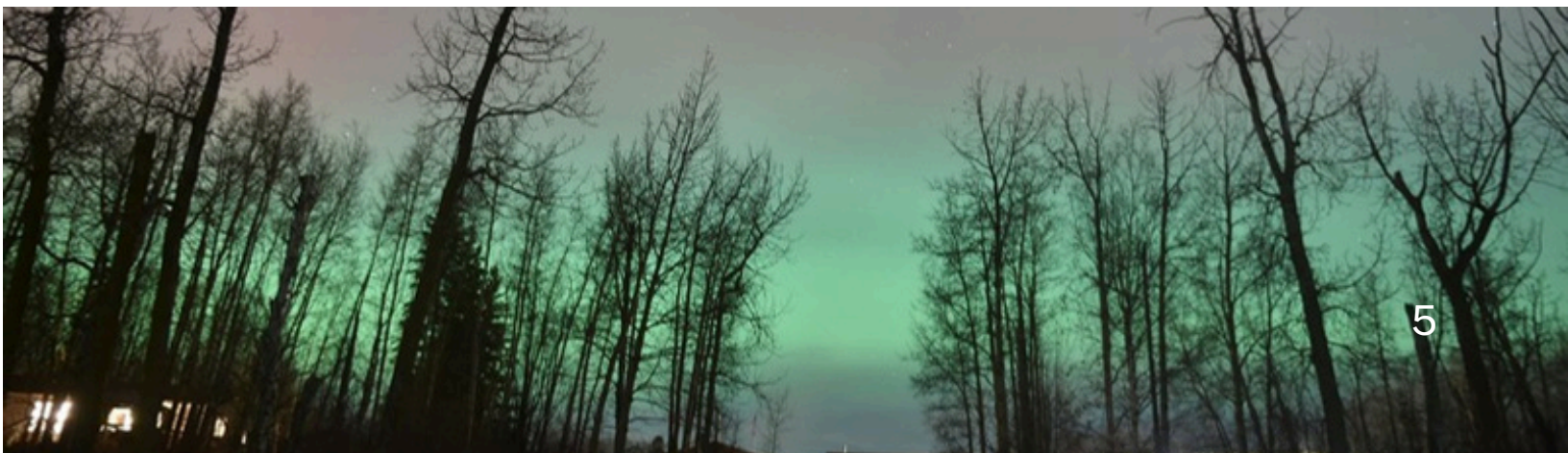
All Camp Warwa staff have first aid training and can provide standard first aid as needed. We will coordinate with your group's first aid person to ensure that adequate care is provided in first-aid situations.

Chaperones pay a reduced rate to come to camp; just enough to cover meals and accommodations. For this reason, there is not usually time for Chaperones to participate in programs at the same level as campers. Our staff will always do their best to have chaperones partake in programs who wish to, providing there is time to do so.

If you are here for a day-use visit, Camp Warwa staff will be present for most of the time you are here, except for your bagged lunch.

If you are here overnight, Camp Warwa staff will also be present for most of the time you are here, up until as late as 7:30 pm. At 7:30 pm, it is the end of the formal program day and Chaperones will be responsible for supervising campers at this time. Staff will be in on call if you need anything, or if there is an emergency.

For overnight groups, from 7:30 pm – 9:00 pm, you are welcome to play games outdoors, socialize, hang out around the campfire, or be in other communal areas. You can also be in your accommodations. At 9 pm, our community quiet hours start, and we ask that campers be in their accommodations and/or preparing for bedtime. If your group would like to have formal social time after 9 pm, please let our staff know and we can set you up with an area where you can do that without disturbing others.



Meal Service

Camp Warwa is a Nut Aware Facility. Please ensure this information is passed on to your participants so they pack a nut-free bagged lunch and or snacks for their visit. Our staff will ask your group if there are any nut products when you arrive. Please help them check to ensure we continue to be nut-aware. All meals served by Camp Warwa are nut-free.

Day-use groups can add a dining meal to their schedule. We would love to serve you lunch or dinner for \$13 per person. Email info@campwarwa.org at least 3 weeks before you're booking to order.

Meal times for most groups are usually standardized at 8:30 am, 12:15 pm, and 5:30 pm. Snacks for overnight groups are provided in the afternoon and at the campfire. Our afternoon snack can consist of fruit, granola bar and water and at campfire, our snack is usually either smores or cookies.

Dietary information needs to be provided 3 weeks before your visit as we are only able to accommodate your needs when requested. Please complete the Visit Worksheet Dietary section so we can properly prepare meals for your group. Staff will check in with you when you arrive to confirm your dietary needs with your Dietary Ambassador. Your Dietary Ambassador will be available at meal times to direct campers and chaperones to their requested meals. If you wish to bring dietary food, please let us know in advance, and we can make arrangements to store it.

During meal service, if you are a multi-day group, we require one chaperone to sit at each table in the dining hall. We will be maintaining group cohorts when multiple groups are eating at the same time in the dining hall. The hall is spacious enough to allow for all groups to have their own tables. Your group may be assigned a specific entrance.

Tea and coffee are available in the dining hall for chaperones as well as adult participants only.

Emergencies

Warwa staff will orient your group to emergency procedures once you arrive. Our emergency muster point is the flag poles located south of the Picnic Shelter. Our backup location is in the quad in front of the cabins.

We recommend that groups bring an emergency vehicle in case a participant or chaperone needs to go to the hospital.

The closest hospital is Stony Plain Hospital. It is located 30 minutes from Camp Warwa. Directions are available in the office.

An ambulance bay is located 15 minutes away in Alberta Beach.

Medications

Camp Warwa staff cannot administer medications to participants. Camp Warwa can provide refrigeration space if medications require it. Please talk with your Warwa staff member.

Fire Ban information:

If there is a fire ban or advisory while you are at camp we may have to modify your programs. <https://www.albertafirebans.ca/>

We will still be doing campfire programs, fire and shelter building and try our hardest for it to not impact your stay (no fires will be light - we will get to imagine the warmth!).

Please let us know if you need support moving any outdoor cooking you have to camp (propane) stoves or small BBQs brought by you.

Fire ban has been shifted to a fire advisory. We are now allowed modest fires in well established fire pits. We can have campfires now at the main pit and pic pav. We can also do firebuilding in trays in the pic pav. Always ensure a water bucket is filled and ready. Also keep fires moderate (no bonfires) and be aware of windy conditions that could blow embers. No fires in the forest fire pits at this time, or anywhere else at camp other than main pit and pic pav



Damages

User groups are responsible for any damages incurred to the facility or property as a result of improper use. If you notice anything on site which requires attention or maybe a danger, please inform a Warwa staff member.

Smoking

Warwa is a smoke-free facility. Chaperones who are smokers must leave the site and go for a walk in the sub-division when smoking. If students are smokers, they must be accompanied by a chaperone when leaving the site.

Alcohol & Marijuana

Alcohol and marijuana are not permitted to be consumed on-site. If chaperones or participants appear to be under the influence and/or their actions are perceived as unsafe, Camp Warwa reserves the right to ask these individuals to leave the site in a safe manner (pick up or cab) at the expense of the individual.

Site Preservation

Warwa has 23 acres which sees over 8,000 clients a year. Our goal is to maintain our site as a natural area as much as possible. Please do not destroy anything that is alive. Please also keep your fires in the designated fire pits.

If you are a camping group, please make sure that the area you were camping in has been cleaned up before your departure (food, extra wood, etc.).

Lost and Found

Camp Warwa does not take responsibility for items brought and left at camp. If any client believes they have left an item at camp, they can call the office and we will do our best to locate it. If we do find the item, it can be picked up at the office or posted to you 'pay on arrival'.

Liability Insurance

Insurance coverage is normally provided through your school board or organization for off-site activities. Please become familiar with your organization's liability policy.

Warwa carries a comprehensive general liability policy covering Warwa staff, clients, and programs of 5 million in coverage, as well as an additional 2 million per occurrence.

Weather and other considerations

Camp Warwa reserves the right to cancel scheduled programming due to unsafe weather.

High wind and thunderstorms can delay or cancel programs such as canoeing, giant swing and high ropes.

If any programs need to be cancelled due to weather, we will have alternate programs prepared based on your program choices. We will communicate these changes to you as soon as possible. This communication is most likely to occur when you arrive, and we have certainty about what the weather will be. In some cases, the weather forecast is clear enough a day ahead of time to allow us to let you know before your arrival.

Camp Warwa continues to operate in almost all types of weather. You can be confident that when you arrive, we will be ready for you.

In severe cases of torrential rain, blizzards or extreme winds, programs may need to be cancelled. This has only happened twice in the past twenty years, but it is not impossible. The call to cancel a program would be made when the weather is both present, and the same-day forecast shows a certainty of the weather continuing throughout the program day.

If you have any [concerns about the weather for your trip](#), please call the office at 780-892-3648. Even if you leave a message on the voicemail, we will check that and get back to you.

Wildfires:

Given the wildfire risk last season, we have also implemented a few additional measures. It is good to note that the location and construction of our dining hall make it very resilient and sheltered from wildfires. It is a safe distance from forested areas and its concrete and steel design makes it fire resistant. It would allow us to shelter in place safely if there was a wildfire on our site.

We have a relationship with the county and have affirmed the ability to access resources in the event we need to evacuate. [If](#) evacuation is necessary, and our clients cannot transport themselves, the county can send buses to our facility to evacuate people. This can be done both if the fire is on our site, as well as if there is a nearby fire that requires evacuation in our area. Camp Warwa monitors all local and relevant wildfires and can advise clients as to the conditions in our area that may affect your visit.

Air Quality procedures:

We monitor the local air quality throughout the day from our office using about three different online resources. Because of our rural location, the air quality tends to be better here than in Edmonton in general, and the direction of the wind can make a big difference when dealing with smoke.

Our programs generally run regardless of air quality. However, there are additional procedures we put in place when the quality hits the 7+ level:

- We look for opportunities to swap high-intensity programs for less active ones. Note that the majority of programs at Camp Warwa are not defined as high intensity, as they do not require high amounts of running or consistent physical exertion.
- We move as many time blocks in the day indoors as possible. This mostly covers things like your bagged lunch, snack and some activities.
- Our staff works with your chaperones to ensure anyone needing an indoor break can do so anytime. Even taking 15 minutes indoors can be very helpful in poor air quality situations. Our new dining hall is air-conditioned, and the air is filtered, so the air quality there is what the students would experience in school.
- We confirm that your chaperones are aware of any campers on-site with breathing conditions such as asthma, etc. If those students are experiencing any coughing, shortness of breath, etc., we would send them inside to the dining hall.

Note that while there is not an air quality measuring station in our immediate area, the 'Genesse' station to the south of us is often the most accurate. The St. Albert station is a good cross reference.

Camp Warwa's policy is to use the air quality rating of our location for making health decisions. It is very common for the air quality to be worse in Edmonton to the point where students may not go outside for recess, and at the same time for the air quality at camp to be significantly better. We recommend that schools consult with Camp Warwa staff to get the most accurate air quality information possible when making decisions on air quality.

Cell Phone & Internet Service

There is cell coverage throughout most of camp property. Camp staff will also orient you to our phones in the office. It is a landline that is local to Edmonton.

Wi-Fi is available to teachers and chaperones only. Please ask your Warwa staff for the password. We ask that you use the internet for emails and communication and avoid using video or music streaming services. We also encourage you to avoid cell phone usage when with your participants during activity blocks.

We ask that participants do not use their cell phones and similar devices during activities. If you wish, once the program day is complete at 7:30 pm, students are welcome to use devices in their accommodations, according to the policies of your group. Please let your participants know that there is no internet available to them, but using data on their phones will work.

Sleeping Accommodation

We have five lodges and one dormitory building. All buildings are fully winterized and are heated. We can add a cot to most of the rooms to increase their capacity by 1 if necessary. Their room breakdowns are below:

South Pavilion (40 people): 4 rooms with 8 beds, 2 rooms with 4 beds

Leewes Lodge (20 people): 2 rooms with 8 beds, 1 connecting room with 4 beds

Simpson Lodge (20 people): 1 room with 8 beds, 1 room with 10 beds, connecting room with 2 beds.

Begin Lodge (20 people): 1 room with 8 beds, 1 room with 8 beds, connecting room with 4 beds

Dunstall Lodge (20 people): 1 room with 8 beds, 1 room with 8 beds, connecting room with 4 beds

Lister Lodge (20 people): 1 room with 8 beds, 1 room with 8 beds, connecting room with 4 beds

The South Pavilion has male and female washrooms with shower facilities. Leewes Lodge has a toilet and sink in each camper space.

Across from the lodges is our washhouse which has male and female washrooms with shower facilities.

We will assign you to the building that will best house your group. This will be indicated on your schedule as well.

We also have a Forest Campsite with multiple Canvas Wall Tents as well as a rustic cabin. These accommodations all have bunk beds and mattresses. They do not have heat or power. All these areas are near each other and accessed from the same path. Each campsite also has a seating area with a campfire pit. Their capacity breakdowns are below:

East Campsite (20 people): 4 canvas tents for 4 people each. 2 canvas tents for 2 people each.

West Campsite (20 people): 4 canvas tents for 4 people each. 2 canvas tents for 2 people each.

The Roost Rustic Cabin (10 people): space for 8 on the main level and 2 in the loft.

You will need to bring your own bedding. Most participants bring a sleeping bag and pillow, which is what we recommend. Our mattresses have a vinyl cover so some prefer to bring a twin-size fitted sheet to put over the mattress.

Picnic Shelter

This covered, open-air shelter is available to be used for when your group has a bagged lunch on the first day. It is also the main cooking area for our camping group packages.

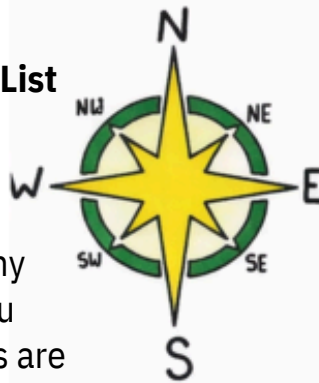
Dining Hall Patio

Outdoor Education Full Program List

The Camp Warwa Outdoor Education Centre offers all the programs below. You can select any combination of programs when you schedule your visit. Most programs are done as rotation blocks of about 75-90 minutes each, in groups of about 10-16. Some programs are also well suited to be done with your entire group. When you book with us, our team will take your program choices and use them to create a full schedule for your visit that meets your needs and goals.

As an accredited member of the Alberta Camping Association, all of our programs follow the highest industry standards for safety and facilitation. We are a waiver-exempt facility and do not require our participants to sign any waivers or releases to participate in our programs. We also follow all safety guidelines and procedures as required by:

- Alberta Education - Guidelines for Physical Activities
- Girl Guides Canada
- Scouts Canada

Rotation Programs: Spring/Fall

Archery

A staple in many camps' programming, Archery is as much fun today as it was years ago. At Camp Warwa, the Archery program is one of the most popular. Participants will learn proper aiming and shooting technique and safety procedures. Activities and games are added to enhance the activity and put our archers to the test!

Tandem Canoeing

Participants first learn the basic canoeing strokes on land before taking to the water in groups of 2 or 3 per canoe. On water, our instructors go through detection and correction of stroke technique and use games and activities to reinforce these skills. The Tandem Canoeing program strives to teach patience, teamwork, skill, and appreciation for canoeing within the framework of an enjoyable activity.

Climbing Wall

One of the most popular activities at Camp Warwa, the Climbing Wall offers participants a mentally, emotionally, and physically challenging task, in a safe and supportive environment. At the outdoor wall, participants learn about trust, support, and encouragement first-hand by operating the belay system. The outdoor wall has 3 belay systems, overhangs, inclines and other features and is 32 feet high.

Fire & Shelter Building

This program provides participants with the theoretical knowledge of fire building – why, when, where – the practical knowledge of how to build a fire as well as knowledge of essential safety and survival techniques. Each camper also gets to build their own fire! They will also learn how to make a practical and effective tarp shelter. Campers will also get to experience a scenario where they will have to put their shelter-building skills to the test.

Forest Exploration

Made up of a variety of smaller games and lessons, participants learn about the natural world in ways that are fun and memorable. Exciting games will get them directly interacting with the natural world while our instructors weave in interesting facts and knowledge. It is a great way to get kids connecting with nature and enjoying their time outside.

Giant Swing

The Giant Swing is a new team challenge for 2022. Participants are clipped into the Giant Swing safety system in groups of 2 or 3 by our trained staff. Our staff then direct the rest of the group to use a pulley to raise the swing team up as high as 30 feet in the air. Once the swing team are as high as they are comfortable, they pull the release cord and swing on a giant pendulum high out and into the air, back and forth many times before eventually coming to rest. This exhilarating experience is a memory participants will never forget that builds confidence and trust. The Giant Swing is open to participants in Grade 4 or older.

Group Challenge Course

Made up of many small activities or challenges, the Group Challenge program provides an excellent opportunity for participants to have fun while learning valuable life lessons. Each activity has an obvious goal, but the group is given certain constraints of challenges, forcing them to think collectively, to communicate and to experiment with different ideas. After each activity, Camp Warwa staff debrief the experience focusing on elements of communication, teamwork, trust and personal experience.

Through the activities, as they dare to try, they begin to experience physical and mental success and recognize that the seemingly difficult is often quite possible.

High Ropes Course

The High Ropes Course is our extensive aerial playground, suspended 10 meters from the ground. This program requires at least 2 ½ - 3 hours to complete, of which the first hour is spent learning the ropes, so to speak, and the safety procedures for the course. The rest of the time, the group spends playing on the ropes and discovering what they are capable of doing – It would surprise even the most confident of people! Although participants travel individually around the course, groups members provide an important network of support, encouragement and trust. And after all the hard work of traveling around the ropes, participants come back to earth via our exciting zipline. After the program, the group members are encouraged to share their experiences with the group and help discover their true potential. The High Ropes Course is only available to groups in Grade 7 or older.

Low Ropes Course

This modified obstacle course allows participants to focus on individual achievement while the group provides “spotting” and verbal encouragement. Groups move through the different elements as a team emphasizing trust and support as they go. The challenges of Low Ropes offer a lot of variety, as well as memorable and exciting moments for participants.

Orienteering

Orienteering puts participants in teams of 2 or more to actively navigate through our professionally designed orienteering course. Participants first learn about the sport of Orienteering, about the use of landmarks in navigation, and reading a map. The course itself reinforces the principles of navigation and relating the real surroundings to the symbolic details of a map.

Photo Scavenger Hunt

In this program, participants use photos to locate different areas of camp and answer trivia questions about camp. Campers will gather clues that they need to unscramble at the end of the activity. It is a fun way to explore the natural environment here at Warwa.

Sling Shot Range

One of our most popular traditional camp activities. Participants will learn proper aiming and shooting technique and safety procedures. Our range is both fun, engaging and safe. Activities and games are added to enhance the activity and test the accuracy of our shooters.

Team All Aboard

The Team All Aboard takes a popular Group Challenge element and thrusts it 20 feet in the air. Four participants support and assist each other to climb the 20` pole and make it on to the 2x2 platform at the top. Meanwhile the rest of the group provides ground support by belaying the climbers. This is a fantastic team building and personal challenge program. Team All Aboard can be done as a small group program rotation, or with the entire group at once.



Smugglers & Spies

In this game campers try to sneak items through the forest, past patrolling staff members, to be delivered to other campers hiding at a secret location. Multiple teams race against each other at a time, all trying to smuggle through as many points as possible, and all trying to avoid being caught!

Stones

Stones is a large group game played by your entire group. It is played on our main field with the entire group. Stones contains physical activity, yet remains inclusive to all regardless of physical ability, and requires strategizing and teamwork for success. Loosely based on Capture the Flag, two teams strive to gain all of the “stones” on their side. Stones can fit into any schedule with no set time needed to play the game.

Survival Game

Also known as Predator & Prey, Survival is a very popular game for all your participants to play at the same time. For campers, it combines specific goals, challenging friends, cooperating with teammates, physical activity and fun. For outdoor educators, it is a useful tool for educating participants in the food chain and the cycle of life, and the strategies behind certain animal body types and behaviour, while having fun the whole time. Participants assume the roles of Carnivores, omnivores, and herbivores and search for elusive food and water stations while being on the lookout for predators and hunters!

Survival is another activity that is inclusive to all, regardless of physical ability.





Vertical Playground

The Vertical Playground is a tweak on a climbing wall program, using mixed media (tires, rope ladders, 4x4s) instead of traditional climbing holds. The entire playground will sway under use making this climb a little more challenging. This is a great program to spice up your visit and add some personal challenge.

Voyageur Canoeing

It takes teamwork to move our 29-foot voyageur canoe, which can seat up to 14 people. Activity groups go on the water as one group after their on-land briefing session and learn that it takes rhythm and teamwork to move such a boat. Games and activities make this program a great team builder and environmental educator.

Zipline

A very popular choice! Participants will learn about the safety procedures of the course, the importance of support and encouragement, and about defining success and failure for themselves. Participants will be clipped into the zipline system by one of our trained staff. Participants make the leap from the zipline tower themselves and enjoy the ride! Participants must be in Grade 6 or older to participate in the zipline.

Action Auction

This game is focused on team building and can be done with the entire group at once. Small groups bid on interesting items that will eventually be used to build an egg protection device! Each team builds a device that is tested at the end of the session to see if the egg will survive a drop.

Capture the Flag

This game is played in our forest and features two teams trying to find and capture each other's flags. The team has three flags to hide and protect, and the team with the most flags at the ends wins!

Weekend Bookings:

Here is your Friday itinerary:

1. When you arrive on Friday, you will be greeted by your host in our parking lot (or dining hall in inclement weather)
2. We will get you settled into your accommodations.
3. Once you are settled, come to the dining hall for a community meeting, and we will set you up with your evening snack of fruit and cookies.
4. Relaxing time! Your choice of an independent activity: hang out around the campfire, play field games (your host can show you what is available) or play board games if the weather is poor.

If you have any activities (craft, group activities, name games, etc.) you would like to lead with your group, let your host know how we can help accommodate them.
